CONFIRMATION CATECHESIS & FORMATION

Candidates for Confirmation at St. Pius X will receive developmentally appropriate catechesis and formation in preparation for receiving the sacrament. This includes the following:

- † Confirmation increases and deepens the grace of Baptism, imprinting an indelible character on the soul.
- † Confirmation strengthens the baptismal conferral of the Holy Spirit on those confirmed in order to incorporate them more firmly in Christ, strengthen their bond with the Church, associate them more closely with the Church's mission, increase in them the gifts of the Holy Spirit and help them bear witness to the Christian faith in words and deeds.
- The sacrament of Confirmation confers the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, understanding, right judgment, courage, knowledge, reverence, and wonder and awe (Is 11:2). These gifts are to be put to use so they will bear much fruit.

 St. Paul lists the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit as: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Gal 5:22-23).
- † The Rite of Confirmation includes these basic symbols: the imposition of hands, the anointing with Sacred Chrism and the words, "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit".
- † The bishop is the ordinary minister of Confirmation, but he can delegate pastors to confirm.
- † Retreat experiences provide an opportunity to encounter Jesus in a special way. A retreat hopes to make possible a connection between "the what" of our faith and "the One" with whom we are being called into relationship, Jesus Christ.
- † Service experiences provide opportunities to *encounter* Jesus in the least of our brothers and sisters. Service also allows us to *be* the face, hands, and feet of Jesus to others.
- † Candidates choose sponsors to be a companion and a guide on their spiritual journey. Sponsors speak in the name of the whole believing community when they present the candidates to the bishop for Confirmation.

"Preparation for Confirmation should aim at leading the Christian toward a more intimate union with Christ and a more lively familiarity with the Holy Spirit ...

To this end catechesis for Confirmation should strive to awaken a sense of belonging to the Church of Jesus Christ, the universal Church as well as the parish community."

(Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1309)

EXPECTATIONS & RESPONSIBILITIES

Parents: The next several months will offer many opportunities for you to become involved and support your daughters and sons as they prepare for Confirmation. If you treat participation in the liturgy and in formal projects seriously, that tells your child that these things are important enough to prepare for, plan for, and participate in fully themselves.

- Share your faith and participate with your daughters and sons as they practice discipleship, learn about the saints, and pray.
- **Review the materials** in the red Confirmation packet and in monthly emails for ideas on how you can help your child live as a disciple.
- Encourage full participation in the liturgy by previewing the gospel and readings before
 mass or by discussing the readings and homily and other parts of the mass on your way
 home and throughout the week.
- Transport your candidate to and from service projects with their Discipleship Groups.

Candidates: To be a fully contributing member of a community demands *presence and participation*. You are preparing for life-long discipleship as a follower of Jesus Christ in the parish and the world at large.

- Participate fully in the parish liturgies in whatever capacity you can. Many serve in the ministries of hospitality, music, altar service, lectors, etc., but most of us participate in the role of the assembly. Whatever you do, do it with your whole heart!
- **Pray, and read scripture:** To encourage your love of reading scripture, the parish will give you a Bible.
- Participation in Confirmation retreats is expected. We have planned two retreats one formal retreat with candidates only and one informal retreat with just candidates and sponsors (to be scheduled at a mutually convenient time with the sponsor). Parents and sponsors will be invited to help at the Candidate-only retreat.
- Participation in Discipleship Group service projects is expected. Groups of candidates will work together in 3 or 4 service projects in the parish and community. This is a valuable opportunity to serve others and reflect on service through the lens of faith.

Coordinator: The parish Sacrament Coordinator will create opportunities to prepare candidates to live out their faith fully and intentionally as disciples of Christ and will share resources to help families and sponsors grow in their own faith during this year of formal sacramental preparation.

- **Encourage the practice of intentional acts of discipleship** through regular emails to candidates, parents and sponsors.
- **Encourage a love of the saints** by sharing stories of their lives with candidates and their families.
- Conduct the retreat for candidates.
- Equip sponsors to serve as spiritual companions for the candidates.

DISCIPLESHIP – INDIVIDUAL AND FAMILY (JAN. – DEC.)

Jesus invites his disciples to love, and serve, and to share the good news of salvation with others.

All Confirmation candidates and your families are encouraged to think in terms of deliberately living as disciples, looking at your everyday lives as precisely where Jesus calls you to serve. (Think of the opportunities for kindness and mercy just in carpool!)

Discipleship and mercy start where you are. When you learn to be attentive to other's needs, you will see opportunities to live as a disciple everywhere. Keep your eyes, ears and hearts open!

The Discipleship Journey booklet is designed to help candidates see yourselves as everyday contributing members of some fundamental groups: family, parish, neighborhood and city (though the principles extend into other groups, such as school, teams, carpool, clubs, etc.).

Candidates are to reflect and report on intentional discipleship in everyday life throughout the year and in the Discipleship Group service projects. The booklet is due **the week of November 5.** The booklet will be used in the Confirmation interview but will be returned to the candidate.

While this is primarily the candidate's responsibility, discipleship and mercy are modeled and nurtured in the family, so parents are expected to encourage and participate in meaningful service and reflection on the expectations and acts of discipleship as well.

Monthly emails will offer suggestions and nudges, but here are some easy ways to make **regular discipleship** a part of the family's relationship with the groups outside of the family:

Parish:

Commit to one hour every 8 weeks to join a team that cleans the church on Saturday mornings. This is a good family activity. (dustingdisciples@stpiusxomaha.org)

During Lent, help the Knights and Men's Club with fundraising events that are fun:

Neighborhood:

Work together to clear a neighbor's snowy sidewalks.

Cook/bake something and deliver it together to take to a homebound neighbor.

Invite a single neighbor for dinner or a game night with your family.

Work together to clean up a neighbor's yard in the spring.

City:

Pick up trash when you walk the trails or use the parks. See who can pick up the most trash, then let the winner choose the family's next movie or game night event.

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DISCIPLESHIP – GROUP SERVICE PROJECTS (SPRING-FALL)

Doing service as a faith community builds the sense of us being the face, hands and feet of Christ on earth. Discipleship Groups are facilitated by pairs of parents who volunteer to plan the events and lead the reflections. These projects are scheduled between May-November. Discipleship Group service projects often take the candidates out of their comfort zone and help them to encounter Christ in places where they've never looked before!

On May 5, 2025, Candidates will get information about the Discipleship Group to which they have been assigned and the service projects that group will perform. Watch for more information in April.

Ten adults are needed to serve as facilitators for 5 Discipleship Groups! Sponsors are welcome to serve as facilitators.

CONFIRMATION NAME

Baptism and Confirmation are closely related sacraments, so closely related, that in the first centuries of the Church, Baptism, Confirmation, and First Eucharist were celebrated in one ceremony known as the Rite of Initiation. We will spend a great deal of time emphasizing the link between Baptism and Confirmation. In Confirmation, we proclaim publicly that we have chosen to live in such a way that our whole life will be a reflection of the love that God first gave at Baptism. For these reasons it is appropriate for you to keep your Baptismal name if it is a saint's name.

If you wish to take another name, you should choose a saint's name. **PRAY!** Just as you should pray about any decision you have to make, ask the Holy Spirit to guide you as you choose a saint as your patron.

Check out books on the lives of the saints to find a saint whose name and charism you would like to have as your own. If you use the internet, be sure to go to a Catholic site, such as https://www.catholic.org/saints/ or, for a more modern look, go to https://www.themodernsaints.com/

SPONSORS

The sponsor is a representative of the Church who not only stands with the candidate at the time of Confirmation but also serves as an example and guide. Sponsors should be a witness to what it means to be led by the Holy Spirit. More than anything else, the sponsor's very example should commend him or her for this role. One of the candidate's baptismal sponsors would be a good choice.

To serve as a representative of the Church, the sponsor must be:

- At least 16 years of age and confirmed in the Church (sponsors must complete and return the Sponsor Information form which includes approval from their parish pastor verifying that they are eligible to serve).
- A practicing Catholic who attends Mass regularly and is in good standing with the Church.
- If married, the sponsor must be in a *sacramental marriage* recognized as valid by the Church. (Again, sacramental marriage supports the sponsor's commitment to living the Catholic faith.)

Parents <u>may not</u> be sponsors. Non-Catholics <u>may not</u> be sponsors. There is no requirement that the sponsor be of the same sex as the confirmed.

Materials to give to sponsors:

- **1. Invitation to serve.** Rewrite and revise the invitation in the packet, or sign it as it is and give/send it to the sponsor with the
- 2. sponsor information form which must be signed and returned to Colleen, and the
- **3**. **sponsor guidebook** which explains the responsibilities of the sponsor and offers important information on how they can help candidates grow in faith.

Being invited to serve as a sponsor is both a great honor and a great responsibility. It is asking them to make a commitment to pray for and walk with the candidate for the next 12 months (and hopefully beyond). Please give sponsors the benefit of these materials for their own faith formation.

Sponsor Zoom Meeting. Sponsors are expected to attend a session via Zoom on either **April 28**th (evening) **or May 18**th (noon).

HOW CAN PARENTS PREPARE THEIR CHILD FOR CONFIRMATION?

The pastor, catechists and parents have the responsibility to ensure and affirm that a candidate for Confirmation is suitably instructed and properly disposed for the renewal of the candidate's baptismal promises and reception of Confirmation.

Specifically to the parents' responsibility, the following suggestions are offered as ways to prepare their candidates:

- Take your child to Mass each weekend. After Mass, over breakfast or lunch (or dinner if Saturday evening!), talk about the Scripture reading and/or the homily.
- Does your family pray together? Now is perfect time to incorporate daily prayer into your family's daily routine.
- Make the Discipleship Group service project dates a priority on your family calendar and take your child to each one. Talk about the project before and after its completion.
- Pray The Apostles' Creed together regularly. Talk about what the faith statements contained in the prayer mean to you. Give your child the opportunity to hear you talk about the meaning of faith in your life.
- Take your child to the church where you were baptized and confirmed, if possible. Talk about your own Confirmation, saint and preparation.
- Ask your child about the saint that he/she has chosen for Confirmation. Ask what qualities drew your child to choose that saint, and what qualities of the saint the child wants to emulate.
- Attend the sacrament of Reconciliation with your child before Confirmation.
- If your child is struggling with a faith issue or has a question about Confirmation, talk about it. Acknowledge their honesty and assist them to find answers.

DETAILS THAT EVERYONE WANTS AT THE LAST MINUTE...

- Receive the sacrament of Reconciliation in the days before, so that your heart is fully open to receiving the gifts of the Spirit.
- Confirmation date Sunday, December 7, 2025
- Mass Time at 11:30 Mass
- Location in the Church, 6905 Blondo, Omaha, NE
- **Practice with sponsors** 30 minutes prior to Mass in the Church
- Dress respectful and modest as befitting a reverent sacramental celebration
 For such a significant spiritual milestone, Candidates and sponsors should
 dress in their Sunday best, including footwear. This demonstrates respect for
 the Archbishop and recognizes the importance of the occasion itself.
 - Suits are not required, but a shirt and tie with a sweater or sport jacket are recommended for the young men.
 - The young women may wear dress slacks, or a skirt or dress of a length appropriate for the occasion. A sweater or jacket must be worn over any tops with bare shoulders.
- Reserved Seating is only for Candidates and sponsors— Candidates and sponsors will sit in the front pews.
- Additional Seating All other seating is open seating for families and guests on a first-come, first-served basis. If you expect more than 9 people to attend, please let me know so I can plan for additional seating in the narthex.
- **EMHCs & Lectors** If family members who will be attending the Mass would like to assist in either ministry, please let me know.
- **Servers** Confirmation Mass requires 5 altar servers, including 2 who carry the archbishop's mitre and crozier.
- Pictures Please do not take pictures or videos during the Confirmation liturgy. Parents are welcome to take pictures of your candidate with the Archbishop after the liturgy.
- **Group photo** taken before the Confirmation Mass.
